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GIFRIC holds four training sessions a year for clinical analysis, as well as weekly seminars. The sessions for the year 1988-1989 are based on the theme "From the clinic of the symptom to the bien dire of the fantasy: a clinic of the real". Practical clinical experience is required in order that one enroll in the program. Sessions will be held Fridays and Saturdays from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm at GIFRIC. The address is 342 St-Cyrille ouest, in Quebec City. The sessions will all be held in French. Previous training sessions on the signifier and the limits of interpretation in the cure have brought up questions regarding the specificity of the psychoanalytic symptom. Indeed, when a symptom begins to disappear, an encounter with the real appears as the death drive in the symptom. This poses many questions regarding the end of the treatment. On October 21-22, 1988, this year's session will study "The body of the letter". The analytic symptom as a writing on the body reveals a part of jouissance which "never ceases writing itself". The second session will be held on December 9-10, 1988. Its theme is "The dimension of writing in the cure". In the cure the slope of the signifier brings the analysand to the place of ethics where the letter supports the "manoeuvre of the écrit," at the limit of the signifier. How can the analyst's desire maintain the openness of this ethical dimension necessary to the time of the cure? On March 3-4, 1989, "A cadre for the ininscriptible" will study how the fantasy offers a frame to the remainder of jouissance which never ceases to write itself. On May 19-20, 1989, Willy Apollon, Danielle Bergeron and Lucie Cantin will conclude these training sessions with a study of the following theme: "The ethical exigency determines the cure as to its endpoint". Psychoanalytic cures End their endpoints around the question of the fantasy. The analytic ethic determines the endpoint of the cure beyond the question of the fantasy. The effects of cure (diminished symptoms, etc.) are deceptive in relation to the function of the fantasy. How does the analyst bring the treatment to its endpoint? The cost of the four sessions is \$425.00 (Canadian), payable in full by October 7, 1988. The cheek should be made out to GIFRIC (address given above) c/o Mme Lucie Cantin. The telephone number is (418) 687-4350. Another program within GIFRIC is working on the problematic of clinical intervention in the family. The 1988-1989 sessions will study how alliances and contracts are made between the lineage within families,

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beyond legal matters, and will also study the passage of a couple to kinship and related problems. The idea that one must consider at least four generations of discourse within lineage, as well as

the discourses peculiar to each generation, will be examined. Sessions will be held on Thursdays and Fridays from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm at the GIFRIC address given above.
