An International Colloquium on Psychosis organized by GIFRIC will be held April 6-8 in Quebec City, Canada. The title is "Psychoanalytic Cure in the Treatment of Psychosis". This conference contradicts the official North American theory that treats psychotic decompensation in psychopharmacological terms and in a medical/hospital setting. Remission of psychotic crises permits psycho-educative activities that aim toward re-entering social life. In this context the psychotic is seen as a definitively handicapped person. This conference will take a different approach, discussing how *psychoanalytic* treatment can bring about concrete changes in the life of the person. Theoretical and clinical approaches are Lacanian.
